Passive Infinitive The passive infinitive is used with other verbs to express an action received by the subject of a sentence It is formed by combining to be with the past participle of a verb The workers simply wish to be rewarded for their efforts Hygiene needs to ...

The choice of a gerund or an infinitive, in some instances, does not affect the meaning of a verb a) I prefer to go to the mall b) I prefer going to the mall Verbs that show emotion and the fulfillment of unfulfillment of an activity may affect the meaning depending on the choice of an infinitive or a gerund Gerunds are used to describe

Unit 3 Gerund, Participle, Infinitive

Gerund is a non-finite verb It looks like a verb but acts like a noun When "verb+ing" works as a "noun and verb", it is called Gerund Functions: 1 Subject of the verb: Swimming is a good exercise Giving is better than receiving Seeing is believing Rising early is a good habit The bold subjects in the above sentences are gerund 2

Using Gerunds and Infinitives

GERUND AND GERUNDIVE I The Gerund The Gerund is a verbal noun, always active in force The infinitive of the verbs supplies the nominative case: Legere est difficile = To read is difficult (reading is difficult) The other cases are formed by adding -nd- to the present stem of the verb (-iend- for 3rd conjugation I-stems and all 4th conjugation verbs), plus the neuter singular endings
